Brereton 2030 . . . Your Village, Your Future, Your Say

The launch of our Neighbourhood Development Plan was announced by the Parish Council on 28th January. A neighbourhood plan is a new way that people can engage with each other to create a vision of the community as it could evolve over the next twenty years, and to create a plan on how this can be realised. This is of particular importance for Brereton given the scale of growth and development proposed by Cheshire East in Congleton, Sandbach and Holmes Chapel, as evidenced in the draft Core Development Strategy documents. Under consideration during the formation of our own Neighbourhood Plan will be such issues as housing, including the type of housing needed and where it might be built and for whom, perhaps particular types of housing for young people or the elderly. We will also be consulting residents about their feelings on transport all the way from buses to the development of new cycle routes perhaps to Holmes Chapel or Sandbach. Other issues can be raised that affects our life in the village, opening up discussion and debate across the parish. The Neighbourhood Plan project team, comprising parish councillors and residents, will be consulting with residents and employers over the next few months to fully understand the concerns and aspirations from all settlements in the parish. The Neighbourhood Plan will then be drafted by the team, after which Cheshire East will review the plan along with a planning inspector. Finally, a referendum of the electorate of Brereton will decide if the plan is to be adopted, and become a statutory planning document alongside the Cheshire East Local Plan. If everything goes to plan, the Neighbourhood Plan will become "live" in early 2015.

The Parish Council and the project team do not underestimate the effort involved in developing our Neighbourhood Plan. It will involve a lot of research and analysis, much consultation with the people of Brereton and other stakeholders, as well as working with planning experts to help us ensure that we comply with all the legal aspects to ensure our resulting plan will withstand the detail scrutiny it will attract from Cheshire East and their independent planning inspectors. We believe this will be worth it to give us a degree of control over the future development of Brereton to ensure it retains the distinctive characteristics of our rural environment that we enjoy today. The Parish Council is confident that this is the right approach, and is budgeting £15,000 over the next 2 years to fund the project. This does mean that the precept (the Parish Council annual budget) will increase for 2013/14 by 17%.

The project team aims to consult with you at various stages throughout the project to seek your views and to keep you fully informed. The first Consultation Event is a drop-in event on

Saturday 16th March between 11am & 2pm at Brereton Primary School Hall.

This is your opportunity to come to meet the project team, and to find out more about the plan, the process we will be following, and start to put forward your ideas for the future of Brereton. Please do try and drop-in for 10 minutes or longer - we look forward to seeing you there.

Brereton 2030 . . . Our Community Our Future



Since our report in the last Newsletter, quite a lot has been happening! Over 100 people came along to our Consultation Event on 16th March, and this was followed up with consultation questionnaires to the Primary School, Playgroup, an event in April at Brereton Heath Local Nature Reserve, and a session with the Youth Forum. Analysis of the results of these surveys is now being reviewed by the project workgroup, and will be available for all to look at in the next few weeks at www.BreretonParishCouncil.org.uk.

The project team will have a stand at the Brereton Garden Party on Saturday 6th July. This will have displays of results from the surveys, as well as our draft Vision and Objectives for the Neighbourhood Plan generated from your responses you provided in the recent survey. This will be a great opportunity for you to meet the project team, see what we are heading towards, and to give us your feedback.

An early indication from the work we have done so far is that we need to assess in more detail the need for the provision of affordable housing for local people. The assessment is seen as a priority by Cheshire East, as well as a key element in developing a balanced and sustainable community. The project team is therefore preparing a Rural Housing Needs Survey which will be delivered to every household in Brereton in the forthcoming weeks. The last survey for Brereton was completed in 2008 and now needs to be refreshed. It will be of enormous help to the project if you can take a few minutes to complete the survey and return it in the pre-paid envelope. Even if you do not have specific housing needs, then we would still encourage you to complete the survey; in this case only the first few questions need be answered.

On an equally important matter, the Parish Council and the project workgroup were very surprised and disappointed to learn that the Cheshire East Strategic Planning Board met on 22nd May but deferred making a decision on our Brereton Neighbourhood Area application. Gaining approval for this is an important step in the formal proc ess for our plan. Brereton Parish Council made this application to Cheshire East Council on 9th January this year after a 3 month local consultation which included all households, businesses, neighbouring parishes, as well as Cheshire East Council planning departments. 36% of our residents responded which was a very good survey response, and of these 99% were all in favour of developing a Neighbourhood Plan for our parish. All in all, we believe this demonstrated a strong mandate to progress with the application to Cheshire East to designate Brereton as a Neighbourhood Area. Parish Councillor Jane Deans who chairs the project workgroup said, "It is particularly frustrating for us that, after 5 months of deliberation on our application, Cheshire East Council does not have sufficient information to make what should be a straightforward and simple decision. It is also 12 months since the gov ernment launched its policy to encourage parish councils to take more responsibility for their own futures in this way. We were surprised that the costs to Cheshire East Council of the administration of the scheme, independent examination and referendum have been flagged as issues as these costs are recoverable in grants to Cheshire East Council from the central government's Department for Communities and Local Government. We are confident that the Strategic Planning Board will view our application more favourably in June. After all, our community is actively embracing the essence of Localism and have complied with all the regulations required for our application to be successful. We do not believe that the Council can refuse this."

[continued from front page] In the last 8 months, from a standing start in January this year, the project team reports they have learned so much about Neighbourhood Planning!

- We are the first parish in Cheshire East to embark upon the initiative, and recently formally achieved Neighbourhood Area Designation.
- We have established links with Cheshire East planning department to ensure we connect with the emerging Cheshire East Local Plan.
- We have researched government websites, planning websites, read case studies and learnings from other parishes who are further down the roadmap in their development of Neighbourhood Plans.
- We have had training from a planning consultant, who came back recently to check how we are doing, and our "report card" said "well done"!
- We have pulled together lots of evidence relevant to our parish, including maps, existing planning policies, emerging planning policies, demographic data, and neighbourhood statistics.
- We have consulted with residents, businesses, organisations, and young people within Brereton, on their current and future aspirations for living and working in Brereton.
- We have launched our Rural Housing Needs Survey for Brereton residents, and will have the analysis in Sept.
- We have produced a Vision and Objectives statement based upon what residents have told us, that now sets out the basis for our ongoing research and development activities. Visit the website to review these.
- We have been successful in our application for needed funding and expert planning support from a government (DCLG) backed organisation set up to support Neighbourhood Plan project teams.

Brereton 2015 to 2030 . . . Neighbourhood Planning 1 Year on!



Mark Elves Workgroup Member



Mark Elves from our project team reports that the Parish Council initiative to create a development plan for Brereton has continued to forge ahead since the last report in the September newsletter. The team has met every week to create development options to meet the objectives that were drawn from your feedback during the consultations earlier this year. The next few months will see things start to move forward quite quickly. Since the last update our workgroup has:

- Finalised the results of the Rural Housing Need Survey carried out in the summer and incorporated these into producing a housing objective that will ensure Brereton remains a vibrant, desirable place, where people want to live and work. Nearly 40% of households responded, so a big thank you to all who took part. You can read the survey report and results via the Neighbourhood Plan page at www.MyBrereton.com.
- Developed and agreed a set of strong objectives, with options to ensure that these are implemented in keeping with the needs of the parish. All of the objectives have been formed from the views of residents in previous consultations.
- Met with representatives from Tattenhall Parish in Cheshire West who have completed their Neighbourhood Plan all the way through to referendum, to learn from their experiences.
- Met with Cheshire East Spatial Planning to understand the impact upon our project of the progress of their Core Development Strategy (Local Plan), and their decision to have additional public consultation (until 16th December) on their Pre-Submission Core Strategy.
- Met with Fiona Bruce MP, who expressed her support and strong interest in the Brereton project. Fiona is fully aware that Brereton is at the forefront of developing a Neighbourhood Plan, and has agreed to take our concerns over the disconnect between recent central government-level planning decisions and the effect it has on the ground in rural communities. Brereton's forward thinking will now be raised at Minister's Questions in the House of Commons, and be talked about at Ministerial level!

In December, a specialist planning consultant is reviewing our work in advance of bringing this stage to you for consultation in January. Banners and posters will start to appear around the parish shortly to let everyone know that

the next consultation is on its way. Mark says, "The team will be going out and around the parish in January to meet residents and discuss their thoughts and concerns regarding the neighbourhood plan options. We aim to personally deliver a set of the plan objectives to every household, with a brief questionnaire asking for your views on them." Remember, every team member will have their ID badge (see Mark's



badge at top of the page) when they call. Ask to see it if you're not sure. The feedback you give us in January will be used when we start to draft the key planning policies that will form the core of our draft Neighbourhood Plan. Brereton will change over the next 15 years, and this is your chance to influence those changes. We want as many people as possible to take part in the consultations, so tell us what you think and make your voice count!

Brereton 2015 to 2030 . . .



A very big "thank-you" to everyone who took the time to respond to our latest consultation exercise. Every household and business in Brereton received a copy of the consultation which summarised the issues identified by residents in earlier consultations, along with draft proposals for

solutions to implement the key areas of each of the five objectives the Neighbourhood Plan workgroup has compiled. A number of residents attended the drop-in event on Saturday 15th February to ask questions of the project team. This consultation stage has closed and the project team is now analysing what you have said. An early view is that the vast majority of respondents are supportive of the proposals. In addition, we are very pleased that about 25% of

households completed the consultation. One of our external planning consultants advised the workgroup that this is a very good response rate at this stage of the project. Clearly we would like a higher response rate since the development of a Neighbourhood Plan will have impact upon all residents and businesses in Brereton, and we want to ensure that decisions we make in the next stage of the planning exercise are representative of the whole parish.



The outcome of the consultation will be published in the next few weeks on the Neighbourhood Plan pages on the community website at www.MyBrereton.com. This will help the workgroup prioritise the most important aspects of local needs that will be carried forward into the development of planning policies for our Neighbourhood Plan. Over the next few months the project workgroup will be undertaking various activities to establish further evidence to underpin these high priority areas prior to drafting the key policies. These activities are likely to include such tasks as landscape assessments, land ownership, market housing analysis, site proposals, sustainability assessments, and more! It's not too late get involved if you would like to participate. We are only about 50% through the project, and still have more than another year to see it through, before we start the implementation phases. So, if you are interested and have some free time, the project team is always keen to have fresh faces on-board.

Rose Cottages Planning Inspector Decision in Favour of Developer

The Planning Inspectorate allowed the developer's appeal for planning application 12/3807C, for land adjacent to Rose Cottage, Holmes Chapel Road, Brereton Heath. Brereton Parish Councillor, Mr. Andy Lindsay, who represented the Parish council at the Appeal hearing, said, "The fact that Cheshire East did not (at the time of the Appeal hearing) have a demonstrable 5 year supply of deliverable housing was crucial to this appeal being allowed. The result is very disappointing but there is no more Brereton Parish Council could have done." The Inspector did not consider the adverse impacts of the development to be sufficient to outweigh the benefit of 25 new houses to the CEC housing shortfall.

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
Issue 30: June 2014

Brereton Parish Neighbourhood Plan . . . 2015 to 2030

John Charlesworth presented our progress to the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council on 19th May. This included what we have achieved so far in 2014, and what we hope to achieve in the next 6 months. John also gave an insightful perspective on his personal involvement in the project. The Parish Council endorsed the project with their full support, saying it was a key initiative for Brereton and that we need to do whatever is necessary to complete the plan.

In February 2014 the Brereton Neighbourhood Development Plan Team undertook a consultation exercise to ascertain the level of support from residents for our draft proposals to deliver the Vision and Objectives. The proposals had been developed by the team from previous surveys, consultations and fieldwork with a wide range of stakeholders.

The consultation document was delivered by hand to all homes in the parish and local businesses. Where possible, residents were individually briefed by team members on the details of the plan and how their input would shape the plans development. At the conclusion of the consultation, a drop-in event was held at Brereton Primary School for those seeking greater detail. A total of 630 consultation packs were distributed. 129 completed documents were returned, which for this type of survey is a very good response rate.




Responses were received from across all settlements of the parish, providing representative sampling data. The two main population centres of Brereton Heath and Brereton Green represented 66% of all respondents. A small number (5) of respondents were from outside the parish.


Some highlights of what you told us.

The proposals received very strong support across all the 5 objective areas with overall 83% of responses in the "agree" to "strongly agree" range.

Objective 1 was all about housing. It was clear the vast majority of respondents (89%) preferred to have any new developments located on brownfield (ie. previously developed) sites.



Objective 4 was about our environment. This was the most strongly supported set of proposals with an average of over 90% "agree" or "strongly agree" to preserve the rural environment that we enjoy throughout Brereton today.



Objective 3 was about strengthening and support for local economic activity. This recorded strong support for local farming but weaker support for other economic activity within the parish.

Brereton Neighbourhood Plan, reported by Alastair Strang

The project is now ramping up to start the writing of the Draft Neighbourhood Plan, having made the decision, approved by the Parish Council, to have a strong focus on development policies, rather than include specific development sites. During August, a planning consultant reviewed the evidence we have collected to date against the high level emerging policies that we drafted. This provides us with a "gap analysis" to plan what additional evidence we need to either firm up or collect. We have contracted a specialist planning consultancy to produce a formal Landscape Assessment of Brereton in September which will provide us with further key evidence on the characteristics of our rural environment and how we can best protect areas of special impor tance including key vistas around the settlement areas. You may also have read recently in the local Chronicle on Cheshire East Council's new found support for Neighbourhood Planning, and they are gearing themselves up to support parishes and towns. Brereton, as the first parish in Cheshire East to be designated a Neighbourhood Area in 2013, is to be included in this. Our project workgroup met with the leader of the Cheshire East Council, Cllr. Michael Jones a few weeks ago to discuss what additional support Brereton can expect from Cheshire East to accelerate our efforts to complete the neighbourhood plan process. Cllr. Jones re-affirmed that the plan must be what the people of Brereton want for the future. He gave us his full support for our efforts so far, and committed "whatever it takes" from Cheshire East Council planning department to help us complete the plan by the first half of 2015. So, during September and October we will write the Draft Neighbourhood Plan (NP). We plan to invite all stakeholders of our Neighbourhood Plan (residents, businesses, neighbouring parishes, statutory authorities, etc.) later in the year, hopefully by December, to review the Draft NP, before we submit it to Cheshire East Council for their formal review. Brereton 2015 to 2030 . . . Our Plan is being Drafted



Alastair Strang, project manager of the Brereton Neigbourhood Plan reports that NP workgroup members are busy writing the DraftNP document. This involves writing the policies that will help determine the outcome of planning applications in Brereton. All the policies need to be justified and referenced with supporting evidence, as well as being in compliance with government and local authority guidance and policy. We now also have the support and help of John Knight who is working on behalf of Cheshire Community Action. John, an experienced planner, is drafting the policy sections of the document.

The Landscape Assessment report from our consultants URS has now been finalised, and the Housing Needs Assessment also commissioned from URS is well under way. We have the draft report and are working towards the final version.

In the meantime, the Cheshire East Local Plan has been under the scrutiny of an independent Examiner. The public enquiry for this has been adjourned to give the Examiner time to review the submissions made from developers. The Examiner has just provided his opinion on the submitted plan which has been much publicised in the press and media. His main findings are that Cheshire East Council's aspirations for economic growth are at a disconnect with the housing development strategy, in that Cheshire East's minimum figure of 27,000 is inadequate; the examiner's view is that in excess of 40,000 should be considered. He has given Cheshire East three options to proceed: the first is to continue with the Examination, in which case the examiner would likely conclude that the Local Plan is unsound - a bad situation for Cheshire East and also us here in Brereton. The second is to take upto 6 months time out to fix the key issues in the plan, and then resume the examination of the plan. The third is to cancel the current examination, take time to change the Local Plan, and to re-submit for a new examination at a later stage. Cheshire East is considering its position, but is likely to take a timeout to listen to advice, make the necessary changes, and consult before re-submission of a revised local plan.

What does this mean for the Brereton NP?

Well, it emphasises the need for us to have our NP in place and to accelerate the completion of it, and that is exactly what we are doing. The workgroup has been following and monitoring the developments of the examination of the Cheshire East Local Plan, as we do need to take into account any key findings. This has unfortunately slowed us down in the last 6 weeks. The workgroup still plans to finish the DraftNP for its next consultation with you in the early part of the new year in 2015. This will be a very important consultation, known as the Regulation 14 Consultation, as we will be seeking the views of not just residents and local business within Brereton, but also with surrounding parishes, and statutory consultees such as public bodies, landowners, as well as the development industry.








Then you will all have a chance to review it and tell us what you think. Look out for the Cr posters to let you know when and how you can do this. Following that, we plan to make our formal submission to Cheshire East Council in June, and all being well to independe examination in September.

All this has been possible thanks to the persistent efforts of our Workgroup project members who volunteer their time and efforts every week. We have used some professional c deliver areas of expertise we do not have. This has included in the last few months the delivery of a very polished Landscape Character Assessment, a Housing Needs Assessi as John Knight from Cheshire Community Action who is working with us to develop the technical aspects of the policy writing.

So, whilst a lot of the background work has been done, this will all become guite visible to you starting from April. We hope you will like what you read!

Tuesday 17th November, 2014

Our workgroup members are busy writing the DraftNP document. We also have the support and help of John Knight who is working on behalf of Cheshire Community Action. Jc experienced planner, is drafting the policy sections of the document.

The Landscape Assessment report from our consultants URS has now been finalised, and the Housing Needs Assessment also commissioned from URS is well under way. We draft report and are working towards the final version.

In the meantime, the Cheshire East Local Plan has been under the scrutiny of an independent Examiner. The public enquiry for this has been suspended to give the Examiner the submissions made from developers. The Examiner has just provided his opinion on the submitted plan which has been much publicised in the press and media. His main fit that Cheshire East Council's aspirations for economic growth are at a disconnect with the housing development strategy, in that too few houses (27,000) are being planned for; examiner's view is that in excess of 48,000 are required. He has given Cheshire East three options to proceed: the first is to continue with the Examination, in which case the ex likely conclude that the Local Plan is unsound - a bad situation for Cheshire East and also us here in Brereton. The second is to take upto 6 months time out to fix the key issues and then resume the examination of the plan. The third is to cancel the current examination, take time to change the Local Plan, and to re-submit for a new examination at a late Cheshire East is considering its position.

What does this mean for the Brereton NP?

Well, it emphasises the need for us to have our NP in place and to accelerate the completion of it, and that is exactly what we are doing. The workgroup has been following and the developments of the examination of the Cheshire East Local Plan, as we do need to take into account any key findings. This has unfortunately slowed us down in the last 6 v workgroup still plans to finish the DraftNP for its next consultation with you in the early part of the new year in 2015.

We have also now formed up the support we will receive from Cheshire East Council, through their agents Cheshire Community Action.

We are still currently working towards completing the DraftNP by December, when we will seek your comments through a consultation process.

A neighbourhood plan is a new way that people can engage with each other to create a vision of the community as it could evolve over the next twenty years, and to create a placan be realised. This is of particular importance for Brereton given the scale of growth and development proposed by Cheshire East in Congleton, Sandbach and Holmes Chap evidenced in the draft Core Development Strategy documents. Under consideration during the formation of our own Neighbourhood Plan will be such issues as housing, include housing needed and where it might be built and for whom, perhaps particular types of housing for young people or the elderly. We will also be consulting residents about their fit transport all the way from buses to the development of new cycle routes perhaps to Holmes Chapel or Sandbach. If everything goes to plan, the Neighbourhood Plan will become "live" in early 2015.

The Parish Council and the project team do not underestimate the effort involved in developing our Neighbourhood Plan. It will involve a lot of research and analysis, much con the people of Brereton and other stakeholders, as well as working with planning experts to help us ensure that we comply with all the legal aspects to ensure our resulting plan the detail scrutiny it will attract from Cheshire East and their independent planning inspectors. We believe this will be worth it to give us a degree of control over the future development to ensure it retains the distinctive characteristics of our rural environment that we enjoy today. The Parish Council is confident that this is the right approach, and is bud £15,000 over the next 2 years to fund the project. This does mean that the precept (the Parish Council annual budget) will increase for 2013/14 by 17%.

Happy New Year to you all!

Well, I have good news to report to you for the start of 2013

At a meeting of the Parish Council on 8th January, we passed all the resolutions and signed the documents to initiate the Neighbourhood Plan for Brereton. Our application to Council to designate Brereton parish as a Neighbourhood Area has now in process.

On Wednesday 16th January, we finally had our first team meeting last, so i though i would give you a short update, especially for those that could not attend.

The meeting was to introduce the project and start to meet everyone who is interested in helping; a bit of "getting to know you" sort of thing!

An overview of the "journey so far" was given, together with an indication of the scope of a Neighbourhood Plan and the value we expect it to bring to Brereton.

It was also noted that since Neighbourhood Plans are a new concept, and no parish in the UK has been through the full process yet, there is very little experience and knowled there are guidelines, but no recipes yet; these are emerging. We are not aware of any other parish in Cheshire East who have made an application to the council to start a Neig Plan.

So, we are all learning!

We expect to get some expert help from CPRE (Campaign for the Protection of Rural England), and we should get some help from Cheshire East council. We also expect to buy planning assistance, to ensure that we fulfill and meet all the detail planning regulations to ensure success of the project.

It is fantastic that quite a few of our residents wish to help in the planning process.

At this stage we cannot say what help we need!

This will be developed over the next few months; see Stage 1 below.

What we can say is that we recognise that not everyone can commit the same amount of time.

We are confident that there will be a wide range of activities we will do, and that there will be plenty of scope for anyone who wants to help, from small tasks over a small period larger tasks over a longer period of time.

The project will be managed by a core team of 4 or 5 who will form the project governance board, which will control the project and make the key decisions, and report to the page Specific task based teams will be formed to undertake all the activities required to be completed, such as research, communications, surveys, data analysis, record keeping, do production, reviews, stakeholder management, publicity, etc etc.

So, what happens next?

Developing a Neighbourhood Plan will be done in 6 project stages over the next 18-24 months.

Stage 1: Getting the Project Started

This will run from now until end of March, and we expect to complete the following:

We will create the project plan of all the activities and tasks we will need to undertake. This will also include building a resource plan of the skills and talents and materials we w order to produce deliverables that will make the Neighbourhood Plan.

We will develop the governance model of how the project will be managed. This will detail how decisions will be made and agreements reached, meeting formats and timetable and various controls, such as record keeping, document review and management, configuration control of all the key project deliverables. Also, it will define how we will control budget, and how we will report back to Brereton Parish Council.

We will liaise with Cheshire East over our application to become a Neighbourhood Area

We will help the parish council make a formal response to the Cheshire East Core Strategy consultation.

Stage 2: Prepare the Neighbourhood Plan

We estimate this will run from April thru to Jan 2014, and will involve:

Understanding the Policies

Establish Evidence Base

Research, Surveys, Consultations, Assessments

Alignment to CEC Local Plan with lots of liaison.

Create local Policies

Submission of draft Neighbourhood Plan to CEC for review and consideration.

Stage 3: Independent Examination

This stage can take approximately 3 months.

This stage is undertaken by Cheshire East and a planning inspector assigned by CEC.

We will provide support to Cheshire East and the appointed inspector if required.

Assuming the plan is passed by the examiner, we are then allowed to proceed to Stage 4.

Otherwise we will need to move back to Stage 2 to undertake some rework.

Stage 4: Community Referendum

This stage can take approximately 3 months.

This stage is undertaken by Cheshire East.

It is a simple referendum by the electorate within the Neighbourhood Area (ie Brereton).

We will need to have an active publicity campaign during this stage.

Assuming the referendum achieves a positive "Yes", then we move to Stage 5.

Otherwise, it is a major rethink!

Stage 5: Implementation & Periodic Review

Cheshire East adopt our Neighbourhood Plan as part of the Local Plan.

We will establish an ongoing planning forum to monitor and review the implementation of the plan.

This will require to monitor and review planning applications that relate to Brereton and to continue liaison with Cheshire East planning.

So, quite a lot to do really!

The first real task is to develop our project plan on how to develop the Neighbourhood Plan.

After our workshop next week, when we produce a first draft of the plan, we will schedule another m February, when we can start to be more specific about the types of activities and the help we will need in the forthcoming months.

In the meantime, if you want to continue to orientate yourself to Neighbourhood Plans, i can suggest a few "light" night-time reading!


